The Berea College Knox Promise Neighborhood uses a place-based, student-focused approach to improve educational outcomes for children from birth to age 24 who live in Appalachian Kentucky. Over 25 partner schools and numerous other organizations, including one of the country's first community action agencies, work with Berea College to implement an array of early learning, curricular, family support, wellness, and safety supports. Because this "neighborhood" is vast and rural, most services are provided within the partner schools.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Cassie attends a small elementary school in rural Kentucky. One day, Cassie saw a simple antibullying poster being hung in the hallways by her Promise School Coordinator, Pam Blake. This gave Cassie the courage to tell Pam, through tears, that she was often ridiculed by a group of students. Pam and Cassie discussed the situation and met with the principal to develop a plan of action. Cassie trusted Pam to take her concern seriously and now says she feels safe and supported at school. The bullying has subsided and, over time, Cassie's attendance and school engagement has improved.
