Operation UNITE (Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation that strives to combat substance abuse and misuse in Kentucky.

Collaborative efforts maximize impact

Partnering for progress

Created in 2003, Operation UNITE - Unlawful Narcotics Investigations, Treatment and Education, Inc. - is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation that strives to combat substance abuse and misuse in Kentucky.

Today, the organization's primary service region includes 32 current or former 5th Congressional District counties across Southern and Eastern Kentucky. However, UNITE reaches all citizens of the Commonwealth through the KY HELP Statewide Call Center and many partnerships with federal, state, and community organizations. These include: Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy, Kentucky Specialty Courts, Kentucky National Guard, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce. Citizens Attacking Addiction Coalition

(Jefferson County), Kentucky State Police, 43 city police departments and 32 county sheriff's offices within the UNITE service region, Kentucky Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources, Addiction Recovery Care, RECON Kentucky, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, Kentucky Cabinet for Health & Family Services, Serve Kentucky (AmeriCorps), Federal Bureau of Investigation, Appalachia HIDTA (High-Intensity Drug Trafficking Area), U.S. Department of Education, Kentucky Department of Education, Leadership Kentucky, ACT Now-Martin County, Berea College Partners for Education, University of Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center, SOAR (Shaping our Appalachia Region), Centers for Disease Control & Prevention, and numerous businesses and industry.

UNITE's primary service region covers 32 counties in the current and former 5th Congressional District, but its reach extends across the entire Commonwealth.

State funding provides the foundation upon which Operation UNITE operates. Additional resources obtained through grants, individual contributions, and corporate donations fund many of the law enforcement, treatment, and education/prevention initiatives provided to citizens of Kentucky.

Much has been accomplished, but more work remains to be done

Emerging from the pandemic

Progress is a process. It cannot be taken for granted, and, unfortunately, it can be reversed. That is why we must be more vigilant, more vocal, and more committed than ever before to defeating the drug epidemic.

Kentucky, through proven partnerships and strong priorities, had made great strides. It was just three years ago – pre-pandemic – that the NORC Walsh Center for

Rural Health Analysis and the University of Kentucky Center of Excellence in Rural Health reported that eight of the 10 counties nationally with the largest declines in drug overdose mortality rate between 2008 and 2017 were located in Eastern Kentucky. Of the top 20 counties nationally, 14 were in Eastern Kentucky.

But the pandemic and influx of fentanyl have proven to be devastating. In 2021, 2,250 Kentuckians died from drug overdoses – a 14.5% increase from 2020. Nationally, the most recent data available from the CDC shows Kentucky moved from eighth to second in overdose fatalities in 2020. With 49.2 deaths per 100,000 residents, we trailed only West Virginia, which had 81.4 deaths per 100,000.

Fentanyl accounted for nearly 70 percent of all overdose deaths. In addition, the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy reported that the widespread availability of potent, inexpensive methamphetamine also played a role in the increase.

We also continue with important education and prevention initiatives, which you will see throughout this report. Since our inception, Operation UNITE has reached nearly 550,000 youth.

In addition, Operation UNITE announced a new partnership in June, which will

This multi-year grant will fund a staff member to focus on increasing access to Naloxone, the life-saving medication that can reverse an overdose from opioids

 including heroin, fentanyl, and other prescription opioids.


This investment will also sharpen Operation UNITE's focus to more effectively and efficiently combat the destructive impact of the opioid crisis.

Focus on education, prevention & treatment initiatives

UNITE leverages funding



The Kentucky General Assembly's \$2 million investment in Operation UNITE during Fiscal Year 2021-22 enabled staff to secure an additional \$9.8 million from grants and private contributions for education/ prevention, treatment, and law enforcement initiatives.

Without funding from the Kentucky General Assembly, Operation UNITE would not be able to provide comprehensive substance use and prevention services to the Commonwealth!

Although primarily serving Southern and Eastern Kentucky, citizens in all 120 counties have access to law enforcement collaborations, treatment and recovery services, and the sharing of education/prevention program expertise and support.

During the fiscal year, 89 percent of all expenses were used to: 1) educate youth and community members about substance use and misuse; 2) provide access to long-term treatment for a substance use disorder; 3) provide support for those in recovery; 4) provide assistance to families impacted by a substance use disorder; or 5) provide antidrug youth programs.

Program expanded to help those entering transitional housing

Demand for treatment explodes

With the emergence of fentanyl and a record increase in overdose deaths, Kentucky experienced a dramatic increase in the number of individuals seeking financial assistance to receive treatment for substance use disorders.

At the beginning of the Fiscal Year, the UNITE Board of Directors upgraded the Treatment Voucher Program to support Kentuckians in need. We could not have anticipated the surge in the number of requests for vouchers to enter long-term, residential treatment.

In October 2021, faced with a shortage of funds and in order to honor commitments to approved clients, UNITE temporarily suspended approving vouchers. Additional funding was provided by the 2022 General Assembly, and the UNITE Voucher Program was able to resume in May.





Personalized assistance for substance use disorders

Call Center serving entire state

New evening and weekend hours enabled Screening and Referral Specialists at the KY HELP Statewide Call Center to respond quickly to Kentuckians confronted with a loved one's addiction.



Specialists help callers navigate through treatment options - from medicationassisted treatment to faithbased care - insurance. recovery resources, and other barriers that may occur.

The Call Center offers support, comfort, and guidance for substance use issues from 8:30 am to 10 pm (EDT) Monday through Friday, and 8:30 am to 5:30 pm (EDT) on Saturdays and Sundays.

They are trained to manage crisis situations, help family members understand the procedure for utilizing Casey's Law, and provide outreach services for up to a year to ensure that a client's needs are being met.

UNITE strategies showcased at Rx Summit

Kentucky takes national stage



Kentucky's tremendous success in reducing drug overdose mortality prior to the COVID-19 pandemic was highlighted on the national stage at the Rx and Illicit Drug Summit in Atlanta in April 2022.

More than 3,000 people representing all 50 states, Puerto Rico, Australia, Canada, and Denmark attended the Rx Summit, the largest collaboration of professionals and advocates who have been impacted by Rx opioid abuse/diversion and heroin use.

The three shared factors that led to a substantial decrease in overdose deaths in Eastern Kentucky at a time in which most parts of the region and country were experiencing the opposite trend.


An independent qualitative study attributed much of this success to the multi-pronged strategies implemented by Operation UNITE, along with the "robust

and cross-sector collaboration" of local and state entities toward policies and practices related to education, prevention, treatment, law enforcement, and stigma reduction.

In addition, attendees learned lessons gleaned from the front lines of the addiction crisis, how to apply successful strategies in other localities, and opportunities to identify the policies and approaches that may be the most impactful to efforts within their own communities.
